Vegetation and Wildlife: Areas with burrowing animals or dense root systems may require deeper installation or armored cables. Flooding and Erosion: In flood-prone or erosion-sensitive areas, burial depth should account for potential soil displacement, and additional protective measures like watertight conduits may be necessary. Seismic Activity: Regions prone to earthquakes may benefit from deeper burial to reduce stress on the cable during ground movement. Protective Measures Armored Cables: Direct-buried cables often use corrugated steel tape (CST) or interlocking armor to resist crushing and rodent damage. Bedding and Backfilling: A layer of fine sand or screened soil (2–3 inches) is recommended at the trench bottom to cushion the cab...
