Conflicting network settings or disabled adapters can prevent the system from detecting the connection. Additional Tips Listen for a click when inserting the cable to confirm it is fully seated. Use shielded cables in environments with high electrical noise to reduce crosstalk. If the problem persists, test the cable with another device or switch port to isolate whether the issue is with the cable, port, or switch hardware.
